Ponderings From Your Pastor

Isaiah 43:19 For Behold I am Doing a New Thing; Do You Not Perceive It?



A new normal. By now we've all gotten the message there really will be no going Pastor back to things as they were before once we get to the other side of this pandemic. Pastor We're all going to have a new normal. And for now we wait. We wait for news of developments of a vaccine. We wait through the holidays, perhaps not seeing our families and friends like we normally would. We wait to see what our school boards and governors will decide about mandates and gatherings.

This week I saw a chart that helped you decide if you are thriving, surviving, struggling or in crisis. I can tell you depending on the day I'm surviving or struggling. At times I'm so tired and I wonder why—it's not like I'm working a physical job and on my feet all day like some of you. I have to remind myself just living through this difficult age takes its toll on all of us. A couple of weeks ago I heard Judy Garland's Have Yourself a Merry Little Christmas and at the line, "until then we'll have to muddle through somehow", I began to weep. This year has been so incredibly hard.

At church we also wait. We weep and we wail internally, if not always visibly, grieving the many losses we've experienced individually, as a community, and as a country. We're filled with all sorts of emotions in response to the way this virus has impacted our lives. Sometime's were angry, sometime's were irritated and annoyed, we're worried, concerned, sad, even sometimes guilty when we see we don't have to struggle as much as someone else does.

I believe this Advent our faith speaks directly to our lives in ways that it maybe hasn't in the past. We may struggle to hang onto hope while we wait for new life, and freedom, grace, peace and love. But I'm here to tell you, if you find yourself struggling, barely holding on, struggling to just survive, one of the great parts of being the body of Christ and belonging to a community, is that we can hope for you. We're like a team of horses, when one horse tires, the other is able to step up and carry more of the weight. We can hold you up like Aaron did for Moses when he was too tired to keep his arms raised on the mountain top.

For we are a people of hope, trusting in the promise of God made through Jesus Christ for all old things will pass away and all things will become new. We trust in the promise that God is doing a new thing, even if we can't always perceive it. Each week, we trust that God's plan of love and salvation, freedom and new life will be slowly revealed to us, until the world is bursting forth with new life being born into the world. Until we can lift our hearts and our voices raised in song, "Joy to the world, the Lord is come! Let earth receive her king. Let every heart prepare him room. Let heaven and nature sing!"

Throughout Advent and into our new year in the church we will be looking very intentionally at the new thing God is doing in our midst. We'll look together and listen to where God is leading us into a new world and lots of new "normals". Throughout this year if anything we've learned that if God is with us who can stand against us! We've been thrust into total and utter chaos and the fact that we continue to gather together to pray and worship God is a witness to our resiliency and tenacity of the faith God has planted in each of us.

Whatever our new normal revealed to us may be, I have complete and utter faith that the people of God, and the community of Emanuel will rise to the challenge and continue on in faithful living and service! Thanks be to God!

Pandemic of Generosity Update

Last Sunday was commitment Sunday, where members had the opportunity to bring forth their pledge for 2021. Like most things in 2020, we had to alter plans on how this was to be done.

It's understanding that many of us may not yet have returned to church services in our building, but instead have viewed services weekly on Facebook or YouTube. For that reason, many of us will need to mail our pledge for 2021 to the church office to the attention of the stewardship committee. In an earlier mailing you received a pledge card and an addressed envelope for this purpose.

To date, Emanuel has received 31 pledges totaling \$64,000. We thank each of you who have either mailed your pledge into the church or placed in the offering during church service. With a total budget last year of \$165,000, you can see that we still have some work to do for 2021. We are looking at about forty additional members who pledged or gave to Emanual this current year, yet have not pledged for 2021. We ask you to prayerfully consider your 2021 commitment.

Emanuel thanks all of you for your commitment of time, talent and financial support during this unusual year. Year to date nearly eighty percent of our pledged members have given 80% to over 100% of their 2020 commitment. Even with all the hurdles and roadblocks, Emanuel continues a strong influence with our members and the community in their daily lives.

Members absent: Joel Hauschild, Mike Loos, Jane Anderson, Stephen Lewis

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. by President Mike Winter. Greg Steensland gave devotions.

Secretary's minutes from the October meeting: Motion to approve by Alan Ellis, seconded by Matt Solon. John Spilde corrected the minutes to read that the Prayer Chain is being worked on, not up and running. Pastor Cara will check into where this stands and report back next month. Motion carried with the correction.

Financial Secretary report: Motion to approve by Alan Ellis, seconded by John Spilde. Motion carried. Treasurer's report: Motion to approve by Char Les Kemmish, seconded by Nick Rickard. Motion carried.

Capital Fund report: Motion to approve by Greg Steensland, seconded by Char Les Kemmish. Motion carried.

Memorial Fund report: Motion to approve by Alan Ellis, seconded by John Spilde.

Discussion: Greg Steensland noted that several of the names/funds on this report have been on there for a long time. Should relatives be contacted about their wishes for how to use the funds? Char Les Kemmish brought up using some of the funds to purchase a new sign for out front. Allan Ellis has done extensive research on this and will update his findings and report back. Motion carried after discussion.

Committee reports:

•John Spilde reported for the Fresh Start Committee. He has been in contact with Dwight Rogers, who is doing well.

Pastor Cara gave her monthly written report. She highlighted the bell choir practices being held and a conversation she had with Mike Klinefelter, a regional ELCA representative who has some different investment opportunities available and is willing to share those with us. The Tai Chi group is still willing to make a donation to the church. Pastor Cara is in contact with the group to offer suggestions.

Old Business:

- •Jane Anderson submitted her thoughts to the Council that a portion of the funds received from Elizabeth Miller should be used for some kind of music purchase, since this was an area Elizabeth was deeply interested in. Purchasing a set of bells for the bell choir was one idea discussed.
- •Michaela Lewis gave an update to President Mike Winter on the cameras/equipment purchased (approved up to \$750 using funds from memorials at last month's Council meeting.) Some items have had to be returned and others will need to be purchased. President Winter will get an estimated cost from Michaela and report back to Council members. Additional purchases would also be made using memorial funds.

New Business:

- •A new computer was purchased for Pastor Cara for \$565. A motion was made by John Spilde, seconded by Nick Rickard, to approve this purchase using funds from the Office Supplies account.
- •Rosie Spangenberg brought up the need to set plans in motion for the Annual Meeting to be held on January 24, 2021, and how the meeting may look different than in past years. This will be an action item at the December Council meeting.
- New Council members will be needed to replace Rosie Spangenberg, Stephen Lewis, and John Spilde, who cannot be on the Council for another term, according to the bylaws.
- •Council members whose terms are up but have agreed to serve another term and are eligible to do so include Nick Rickard, Alan Ellis, and Mike Winter.
- •Any Emanuel member who is willing to serve on the Council for a two year term should contact President Mike Winter.
- •Next meeting is December 21, devotions by John Spilde.
- •A motion to adjourn the meeting was made by Matt Solon, seconded by Alan Ellis. Motion carried. The meeting was adjourned by President Mike Winter at 7:50 p.m.



Emanuel Lutheran Safety Group

As we are moving into the colder holiday season, I thought I would share some tips that I found on NSC.org, the National Safety Council. Most of them we know, but it's always good to have a refresher.

If you are traveling:

- Prepare your car for winter and keep an emergency preparedness kit with you
- Get a good night's sleep before departing and avoid drowsy driving
- · Leave early, planning ahead for heavy traffic
- Put that cell phone away; many distractions occur while driving, but cell phones are the main culprit

If you are decorating:

- Keep potentially poisonous plants mistletoe, holly berries, Jerusalem cherry and amaryllis – away from children
- If using an artificial tree, check that it is labeled "fire resistant"
- If using a live tree, cut off about 2 inches of the trunk to expose fresh wood for better water absorption, remember to water it and remove it from your home when it is dry
- Place your tree at least 3 feet away from fireplaces, radiators and other heat sources, making certain not to block doorways

- Avoid placing breakable ornaments or ones with small, detachable parts on lower tree branches where small children can reach them
- Only use indoor lights indoors and outdoor lights outdoors, and <u>choose the right lad-</u> <u>der</u> for the task when hanging lights
- Replace light sets that have broken or cracked sockets, frayed or bare wires, or loose connections

If you are cooking:

- Wash your hands frequently when handling food
- Keep raw meat away from fresh produce
- Use separate cutting boards, plate and utensils for uncooked and cooked meats to avoid cross -contamination
- Use a food thermometer to make sure meat is cooked to a safe temperature
- Refrigerate hot or cold leftover food within two hours of being served
- When storing turkey, cut the leftovers in small pieces so they will chill quickly
