A Post from the Pastor

Silver and gold have I none, but such as I have I give thee, in the name of Jesus Christ, of Nazareth rise up and walk! They went walking and leaping and praising God, walking and leaping and praising God, In the name of Jesus Christ, of Nazareth rise up and walk!

As I write this I'm two days out from my surgery. I anticipate and look forward to all the activities I'll be able to return to once I've healed. I'll be able to dance, and to swim, and to ride a bike, and to walk without pain!

I also have been realizing how much living with physical pain has taught me about listening to my body and how much it's taught me about pain on the inside that we all carry with us as well.

Physical pain has taught me to always look for that sweet spot between motion and activity, but not to the point of injury. It's about balance and paying attention to what's going on.

Internally, we have so many painful things we don't like to think about so we shove them into a closet that come tumbling out when the door is opened. This time has helped me to learn to listen to the internal rhythms and to allow myself to reach out for the help and support I need.

In physical therapy I've learned to focus on each muscle—core, arms, hamstrings, calf, ankles, knees, hips, to slow down and move with deliberation and focus. My exercise, especially in the pool, becomes like a walking meditation. My breathing slows, and I relax. Every other worry and concern floats away and I walk out of the pool jelly legged and refreshed and able to move with greater ease.

I've learned to be more open to accepting help, accepting my limitations, and embracing the tools, like crutches or a cane, when they became needed to keep me safe and upright.

All of these lessons have become part of my healing, inside and out.



We can get so busy that we don't feel we have the time or energy or focus to attend to our inner hurts and pains. Yet Scripture tells us, do we not know that we are the temple of the Holy Spirit? We are of incredible and immense value and worth in the eyes of our Creator who made us. Shouldn't we also value ourselves? Valuing doesn't have to mean self-worship or self-absorption. It's a matter of caring for the gift God has given us.

Like my dad used to say, God don't make no junk.

I praise God for each of you and for the privilege to serve you as your pastor.

The meeting was called to order at 7:03 p.m. by • President Greg Steensland

Devotions: Michael Winter

Council Agenda:

- Motion by Matt Perrone, seconded by Mike Hipnar to approve the minutes of the previous meeting. Approved.
- Motion by Char Les Kemmish, seconded by Richard Reed to approve the Consolidated Fund report. Approved.
- Motion by Matt Perone, seconded by Mike Loos to approve the treasurer's report for March. Approved. However, a question was asked, but not answered concerning a charge of \$1,570.99 for maintenance.
- Motion by Mike Loos, seconded by Connie Edson to approve the April treasurer's report. Approved.
- Motion by Mike Hipnar, seconded by Matt Perone to approve the Capitol and Building Fund report. Approved.
- Richard Reed asked if the Stewardship Committee could move \$75,000 of the \$150,000 from the Noran Davis Estate to a certificate of deposit.

Motion by Richard Reed, seconded by Matt Perone to allow this transaction. Approved.

- Motion by Mike Loos, seconded by Char Les Kemmish to approve the Memorial Fund report. Approved.
- Pastor Cara has submitted a detailed report setting out her job description and goals along with a job description and goals for other employees including Cindy, Michaela and Steve Lewis.



- Discussion was held concerning Linda Martens breaking her arm while at work day at the church and President Steensland will notify our insurance company of the injury in the event that the Martens' insurance company makes a claim against the church.
- Pastor requested vacation days for May 30 and for June 26-29. Motion by Mike Winter, seconded by Mike Hipnar to grant the vacation days. Approved.
- Pastor presented her report to the council concerning Children's Ministry, summer activity planning, the 2 day event in Omaha regarding training forum for youth and children's ministry, confirmation, senior high school graduation recognition, gift cards to college students and the ECLA gathering in New Orleans on July 16-20.
- Brittney Smith agreed to check with other churches concerning their protection from liability for installing playground equipment on their property.
- Connie Edson is going to ask that a sign-up sheet be passed around for volunteers to bring food for the food ministry.
 - Char Les Kemmish made a report from the Property Committee indicating that \$156 was spent for plants, trees and garden hoses and that she is seeking bids to repair a broken window. She also reported no progress on remodeling of restrooms. Homestead Extension for Seniors and Veterans

lowans who were 65 or older on January 1, 2023, will receive a homestead exemption for their principal residence starting with the bill due in September 2024.

There is a July 1 deadline.

Those who qualify must submit an application to their city or county assessor before July 1, 2023. Iowans who turn 65 in future years will need to file the form before July 1 of the year following their 65th birthday. The application only needs to be submitted once unless the taxpayer moves to a new primary residence.

How much will this lower property tax bills?

The new law provides a \$3,250 exemption for the most recent assessment done in 2023. It will then increase to \$6,500 for the 2024 assessment year. The amount of savings will vary across lowa because consolidated property tax rates differ from community to community.

What is a homestead exemption?

A recent ITR Foundation article by Sarah Curry explains that exemptions reduce property taxes (in most cases) by exempting a certain amount of a home's value from taxation. However, the downside to this relief program is that it is more taxpayer-active than other forms of tax relief because taxpayers must apply for their relief.

Military Service Property Tax Exemption:

The military service property tax exemption will increase from \$1,852 to \$4,000, starting in FY 2025. This tax break is available to "an honorably separated, retired, furloughed to a reserve, placed on inactive status or discharged veteran."

Veterans who already receive the exemption do not need to re-apply, but new applicants must submit the application form by July 1.

Using the same statewide average tax rate, Robinson estimates that the annual benefit to veterans will increase from \$62 to \$135 per year.
