Periodic Pastoral Ponderings

(From a guy who likes alliteration a lot)

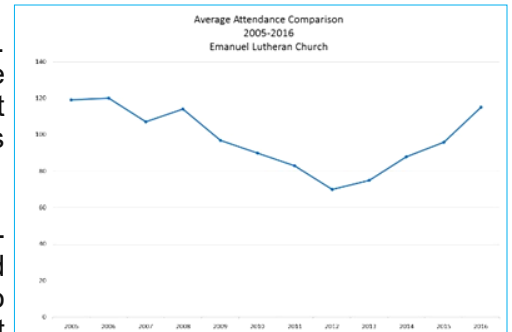

Dear friends in Christ,

I am reading *American Ulysses: A Life of Ulysses S. Grant*, by Ronald C. White (hurrah, once again, for the Council Bluffs Public Library!). I am struck by Grant's approach to warfare and to life. For Grant there was either "attack" or "retreat." There were moments for regrouping, refitting and re-forming his armies. But those moments were temporary and strategic. Other generals spent too much time allowing preparation to serve as a cover for uncertainty and indecision. As Lincoln said of Grant, "I can't spare this man; he fights."

Either forward or backward, growth or decline—this is the way of life. This is the case in the church as well. Please look at the chart on the right. This is a comparison of average weekly attendance for the past twelve years at Emanuel Lutheran Church. This information indicates several things.

From 2005 through 2013, this congregation was experiencing significant decline. Since 2013 this congregation has reversed that trend and entered a time of numerical growth. Emanuel has returned almost to the attendance of 2005-2006. So we have interrupted a trend that would have led at some point to the closure of Emanuel Lutheran Church.



We can rest content at this point. If we do that, we will perhaps experience a few more years of growth due to inertia. Then the decline will resume. Or we can continue to press forward in our mission and service here at Emanuel. I believe that is our vocation at this time—Forward! And that is my intention as pastor here.

I believe that continued numerical growth is directly related to our willingness to reach our neighborhood and larger community through loving service in Jesus' name. We are called to embody the name of this congregation: "Emanuel" (God with us). We are called to be the "with us" people for our neighborhood, community and synod.

I believe this means that we should go forward with our Daycare mission project. The Feasibility Study group has charted a path forward that will work. The Church Council has placed this matter on the agenda of our annual meeting with a positive endorsement. I hope you will attend that meeting on January 22nd and support this new direction in mission and service.

I believe this means that we must continue to expand and strengthen our midweek meal, worship service and programming. Much of the attendance growth in the past year is due to that service and programming.

I believe this means that we must respond to the changing needs and realities of our immediate neighborhood. We will soon have three dozen new neighbors in the former Gunn School building. Many of them will need transportation to worship and other activities. The need for a church bus or van has not dissipated. It has increased.

I believe that we must find ways to build our youth activities and programming. We are blessed with a wonderful bunch of middle schoolers and high schoolers. Will we be with them as they grow in faith, hope and love (especially as they travel to Houston for the 2018 ELCA Youth Gathering)?

And I believe that we must continue to support the growth in both numbers and energy of our Sunday morning worship service. We have wonderful worship leadership, music and fellowship. How many people will you invite this year to check us out?

As you heard in our stewardship appeal, we are "*on the verge*"—ready for the next generation of mission and service. The direction is "Forward!"—with the Holy Spirit's guidance, energy and courage.

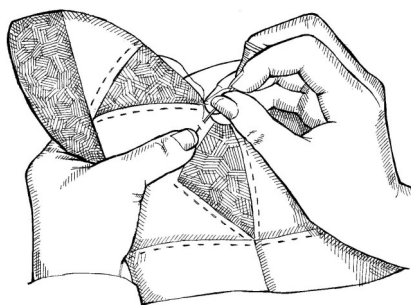
Covers of Comfort

The Companion Synod Network will offer two opportunities in 2017 for travel to visit the Western Iowa Synod's companion churches.

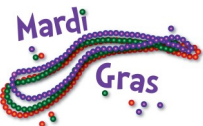

A New Harmony

Zach has always had a love of the outdoors. In his free time, he can usually be found in his back yard, mowing the lawn or making sure his snow blower is working properly before the first snow.

But when Zach began working with his hourly support staff, Shane, he found a new love: music.

Shane is an hourly support staff with LSI's Services for People with Disabilities. Each week, the duo works together to help Zach stay active in the community, practice his coping skills, and achieve his personal goals. Music therapy has become a major part of their time together.

"We play guitar quite a bit," Shane says. "I think music therapy is very important. It just helps calm the soul down."

During each session, Shane teaches Zach a few new chords or strumming patterns that Zach can practice on his own.

"I know when I've had a long, bad day at work, I get kind of angry rather quickly," Zach says. "If I can, I go to my room and grab my guitar and start strumming some chords. I'm not much of a singer, but I've started putting some words with some of the jamming out I do."

Seeing Zach's new appreciation for guitar is just one way Shane is constantly inspired to come to work.

"A lot of motivation for hourly work is you only have a short amount of time with the individual, and it has to change their life," he says. "When we can use our time to utilize music like Zach has, it can be a great coping skill, and it's working for him."

The meeting was called to order at 7:02 p.m. by President Kevin Epperson.

Council Agenda:

- Motion by Oscar Over, seconded by Bob Vergamini to approve the Financial Secretary report. Approved.
- Motion by Oscar Over, seconded by Bob Vergamini to approve the Treasurer's Report. Approved.
- Motion by Oscar Over, seconded by Bob Vergamini, to approve the Capital Fund Report. Approved.

- Pastor Hennigs gave his report which consisted of 12 items. He reminded us that the Fresh Start Team met on November 28 and that Dwight Rogers has now returned to the community and met with the team on December 6. The Anniversary Team presented a check for \$7,704.23 as Emanuel's anniversary gift for the Igumbilo Girls' School. Our story will be featured in the next Companion Synod Network newsletter. Cheryl Coble was received as a new member of Emanuel by affirmation of faith on December 4 and Judy, Richard, Cyndi and AJ Borwick, along with Ashley and Jessica Borwick, were received as new members by letter of transfer from Faith Lutheran Church. Pastor indicated that he officiated at the funeral of Anna Ellingsen and that Bruce Ellingsen was very appreciative. Pastor Luke Kuenzli and his wife gave birth to a little girl. Pastor Luke did a wonderful job at our stewardship banquet in November. Emanuel shared a Thanksgiving Eve service with St. Paul's Episcopal Church and 45 people from Emanuel attended the supper and service. A church member asked for some emergency support from the Special Needs Fund and \$300 was approved for that purpose. We received a letter from Bethany Lutheran Home indicating that their annual meeting will be held on Sunday, January 8, 2017. Dan and Judy Heithoff plan to attend that meeting and Dan will be nominated and he has agreed to serve on the board. There will be a Blue Christmas service on December 21 for families that have suffered a loss during the past year.
- Motion made by Suzanne Winter, seconded by Bob Vergamini to approve the new members. Approved.
- The Stewardship committee report indicated that there are still outstanding pledges.
- The Youth and Children's Ministries report was received. Emanuel has been making a \$500 annual commitment to the Lutheran Lakeside Campaign. Emanuel is able to make this contribution each year from the coffee hour free will donations. This commitment is for three years through the year 2017. The North Broadway Neighborhood Association met at Emanuel on December 5. More than 40 people attended. They are working on new playground equipment for Kimball Park and other improvements that may cost anywhere from \$800,000-\$1,000,000. That money will be provided by the city, through grants and donations.
- The Property Committee reported that the flashing has been installed, but the fire pit and benches have been put off until spring as an eagle project for Ian Waldon.
- Wider Ministries reported that the angel tree ornaments have all been taken and accounted for.
- The Worship and Music Committee reported that the new CD player has been updated and purchased. We also have received the new chalice and paten (plate).
- The Evangelism Committee report by Pastor Hennigs indicated that 1,700 mailboxes have received mailings of future activities at Emanuel distributed throughout the neighborhood at a cost of \$130.
- There was no report from the Mutual Ministries Committee.

- Discussion was held concerning the daycare feasibility study. A presentation was made on December 4 and it is estimated that there will be a cost of \$40,000 start up and a total cost of approximately \$340,000. This money could be raised by a capital fund drive or a grant application which must be made by June. Grants do not have to be paid back. It is the hope that the daycare will be ready to open sometime in the year 2018. It is possible that the Mission Investment Fund of ELCA is possible as a funding source for some of the cost. This would be a loan that must be repaid.
- Motion by Suzanne Winter, seconded by Bob Vergamini to place daycare vote on the agenda for the congregational meeting on January 22, 2017 with the endorsement of the church council. Approved. If approved by the congregation, the church will need to have a Capital Fund Committee and a Construction Committee to oversee the money used for the project and to oversee the construction and hire contractors.
- Year End Committee reports are due as soon as possible, but no later than January 1, 2017.
- A discussion was held by the church council concerning replacing outgoing members with new council members.
- Motion by Bob Vergamini, seconded by Suzanne Winter to adjourn at 8:10 p.m. Approved.

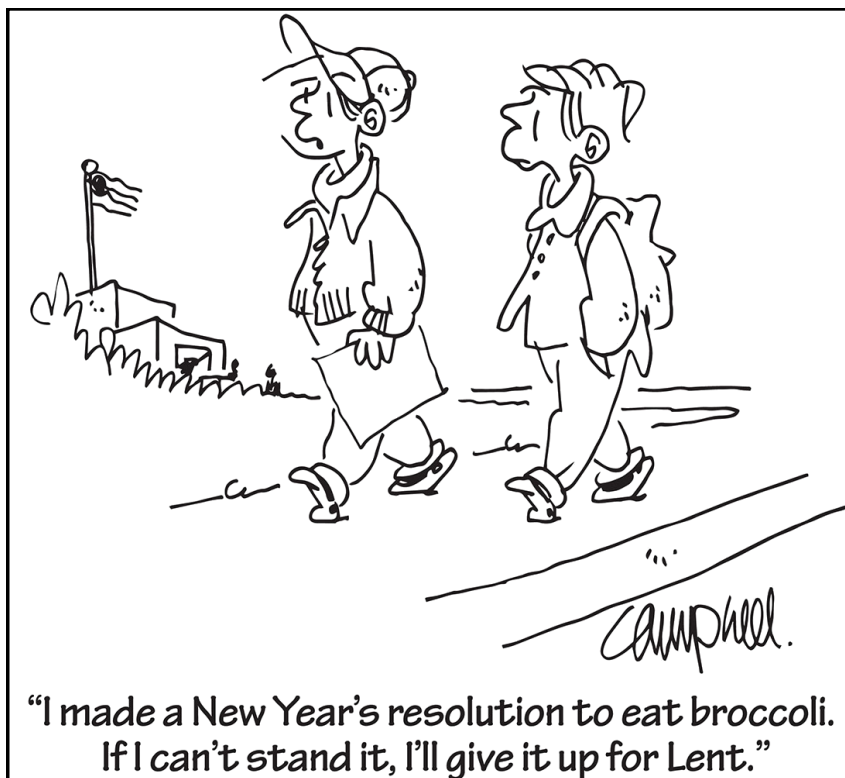

Ramblings from the Back Corner

During this 500 Anniversary of the Reformation year we will be looking at hymns that continue on that reformation in hymnody. “In his beginnings of liturgical reform, Martin Luther sometimes suggested using hymn paraphrases for parts of the liturgy such as the Creed hymn (ELW 411) and the ‘Holy, Holy, Holy’ hymn (ELW 868). ‘O Lord, now let your servant’ continues this tradition, offering a paraphrase of Simeon’s song (Now, Lord, you let your servant go in peace) in a text by an American writer paired with a Finnish folk tune”. 
The first stanza of this hymn is a metrical paraphrase of the Nunc dimittis, Simeon’s song when he saw Jesus, as recorded in Luke 2:29-32. The second stanza moves to our response and the gathering before Christ the daystar when faith turns to sight. This hymn was written by Ernest E. Ryden (September 12, 1886-January 1, 1981) in 1924 and included in The Hymnal (Rock Island, 1925) of the Augustana Synod. There it had three stanzas. Evangelical Lutheran Worship, like Lutheran Book of Worship (1978), printed the first and last.

Ernest Edwin Ryden was born in Kansas City, Missouri, into a Swedish family. He went to manual training school there, worked for the newspaper of the Kansas City Railway, and then was a telegraph editor for a newspaper in Moline, Illinois. He graduated from Augustana College, Rock Island, in 1910 (from which he also received a DD in 1930), went to Augustana Seminary, and was ordained in the Evangelical Lutheran Augustana Synod in 1914, the same year he married Agnes E. Johnson, who was a church organist and also a graduate of Augustana College. They had a son and three daughters. He served churches in New York, Chicago, Minnesota, and Connecticut, among them the large and influential Gloria Dei Lutheran Church in St. Paul. Editor, president of church boards, and instrumental in building orphanages, he was a delegate to the Lutheran World Federation in Paris in 1935 and a representative to the World Council of Churches in Copenhagen in 1948.

Ryden contributed greatly to hymnody. When he was in St. Paul he had a weekly radio program on the hymns of the church. He wrote and translated hymns, was one of The Hymnal (Rock Island, 1925) and the Junior Hymnal (Rock Island, 1928) of the Augustana Synod, was the secretary of the commission that prepared the Service Book and Hymnal (1958), and wrote The Story of Our Hymns (1930) and The Story of Christian Hymnody (1959).

KOURTANE

This melody has sometimes been named for Nyland, a province in Finland, but it probably comes from the province of Kuortane, which explains Lutheran Book of Worship’s (1978) choice of a name (carried forward here). The tune first entered a Finnish hymnal in the appendix to Suomen Evankelis Luterilaisen Kirken Koraalikirja (Helsinki, 1909) and English hymnody in The Revised Church Hymnary (Edinburgh, 1927). Armin Haeussler made valiant efforts to trace its origins, but came up empty. At first glance it appears to be in bar form, but it is actually a satisfying melodic journey of AA’BA”, which does not engender confusion in spite of the small changes it includes and which congregations delight in singing.
