A Post from the Pastor

Continuing on our theme of trying out new things I wanted to share a couple of resources I've discovered lately. If you're an NPR fan you may have heard of Gregory Warner. I liked to listen to his Rough Translations podcast. Recently he moved over to Substack



and mentioned a podcast called The Ten Minute Bible Hour. Gregory describes this podcast thus: "fly fisherman and scholar Matt Whitman takes us through one book of the Bible at a time, broken down with literary insight and old fashioned edge-of-your-seat storytelling in episodes that are—as promised—ten minute snackers." I gave it a listen

and really enjoyed the episodes I've listened to so far. Matt is a very knowledgeable man with a conversational style that makes Scripture interesting, relevant, and captivating. I'd recommend scrolling to the very bottom and begin with episode 1.

On Thursday morning Bible study we've been viewing the video series Chosen which focuses on the life of Jesus. Far from a documentary, the Chosen takes the life and times of Jesus and tells them as a story with interesting characters that you can relate to. I especially like the character of Nicodemus and Simon.

If you're looking for a great book to get you thinking about God, try out Rachel Held Evans <u>Inspired: Slaying Giants, Walking on Water, and Loving the Bible Again</u>. Rachel blends the biblical narrative with her own life and reflections in an enjoyable way that really makes you think whether you're new to studying the Bible or have been reading it all of your life. Rachel's book is available on Audible as well as in print and is read by the author. I've found I enjoy hearing books read, especially on road trips, or when I'm working on projects that keep my hands busy and leaves my mind available for thinking.

Let me know if you come across an interesting book, show, article, program, etc. I'm always interested and can share with others.




Here are the words of Marty Haugen on the first Sun-

What does an usher do?

For each worship service at Emanuel, we have two ushers. Ushers arrive about 30 minutes prior to the service to greet people. For visitors, they will be the first friendly face they see when they arrive. Ushers give each person or family an announcement page and an attendance form.

Once the service starts, ushers still keep an eye on the door to greet anyone who might be arriving a bit late. The doors to the sanctuary remain open during the service so that Emanuel remains welcoming to latecomers. This also helps avoid shaking the mounted cameras for the livestream.

During the readings, ushers count the number in attendance and record it in a small white binder that sits on the usher stand.

During the offering, ushers pass the offering plates. Ushers also dismiss people by rows to go up for communion. If anyone wants to take communion from their seat, ushers will let Pastor know when they take communion after everyone else.

Rick Stone recruits volunteers to help with this important role at Emanuel. If this is something you think you would like to help with, please contact him or the church office.



Our altar guild has a few different rolls at Emanuel. They are responsible for setting up communion each week and then cleaning up the altar after the service.

Before the service, they prepare the trays of wine and grape juice. We have a small communion cup filler that makes it easy to fill the small cups, so it doesn't take too much time. Our wafers come in packs of 100 and are poured onto the communion plate. There is also a larger wafer that is placed on a plate for pastor and some wine is put in a chalice for her to use when reading the words of institution during the service.

When the service is done, the altar guild puts away the communion trays and cleans up any spills and disposes of the used communion cups. This is a great behind the scenes job if you are not a fan of being up in front of others.



What does a coffee hour host do?

Coffee hour is a nice way to socialize after the church service. Most weeks we order donuts from Walmart, as they seem to be the most cost effective option in the area. If you sign-up to host coffee hour, Michaela will see which store you prefer to pick-up donuts at and order them for curbside pickup on Sunday morning. All other supplies should be stocked in the kitchen.

After coffee hour, the host wipes down tables and consolidates any leftover pastries. If we are low on supplies, hosts can let Michaela know so that they can be restocked.

If a person or group prefers to bring something other than donuts, they just need to talk with Michaela so the donuts are not ordered that week.



Just a reminder that if Council Bluffs Public Schools cancels activities due to weather, the office will close and activities and meetings scheduled for that day will also be cancelled or rescheduled. Council Council Minutes for January 22, 2024

The meeting was called to order at 7 p.m. by President Greg Steensland

Devotions: Pastor Cara Knutson

Council Agenda:

- The council received a report regarding the 2024 budget from Rick Stone and Connie Solon. The initial proposed budget for 2024 is \$178,108, but that might be slightly higher after correction for staff salaries. After taking into account pledges, it is estimated that there will be a deficit for 2024 of over \$15,000. This deficit is after taking into account estimated interest income from certificates of deposit in the amount of \$33,000.
- Motion by Mike Loos, seconded by Richard Reed to amend the staff salaries to reflect the church secretary working 30 hours a week. Approved.
- Motion by Char Les Kemmish, seconded by Mike Hipnar to approve the budget as amended. Approved.
- Report from Richard Reed concerning transfer of funds from special accounts totaling \$5,773.13.
 Those accounts return to zero beginning in 2024.
 Motion by Mike Hipnar, seconded by Connie Edson to approve those transfers. Approved.
- Motion by Richard Reed, seconded by Mike Loos to correct the December minutes to reflect that the invoice from A Raymond Plumbing was to be paid from the Noran Davis Estate rather than dividends received from CD's in February. Approved.

- Motion by Mike Hipnar, seconded by Char Les Kemmish to approve the December minutes as amended. Approved.
- Motion by Mike Loos, seconded by Mike Winter to approve the Treasurer's report. Approved.
- Motion by Richard Reed, seconded by Char Les Kemmish to approve the Consolidated Funds report. Approved.
- Motion by Mike Hipnar, seconded by Connie Edson to approve the Capitol and Building Fund report. Approved.
- Motion by Connie Edson, seconded by Mike Hipnar to approve the Memorial Fund report. Approved.
- Mike Loos reported that we need volunteers for the Altar Guild.
- Mike Hipnar reported that we need to come up with new ideas for raising revenue to address the budget deficit. He suggested renting the facilities, both indoor and outdoor, for organizations and perhaps a virtual bingo. He invited others to think outside the box for other revenue raising ideas.
- Pastor Cara reported on repairs to the parsonage and reported on upcoming events including Ash Wednesday, Maundy Thursday and Good Friday.
- Greg Steensland will do devotions for the February meeting.
- Motion by Mike Winter, seconded by Mike Hipnar to adjourn the meeting at 8:35 p.m. Approved.

Note: The date of the February meeting will be decided at the first meeting of the new church council after the annual meeting.

Definition

Lent is the forty-day season (excluding Sundays) of penitence and preparation for the Three Days of Holy Week and Easter.

A Very Brief History

The term "Lent" originally comes from the Anglo-Saxon word "lencten" which means "spring." This is the time, in the Northern Hemisphere, when the days are lengthening. The season began as period of fasting leading up to the Vigil of Easter. Catechumens, those preparing for baptism at Easter, would fast and spend days in intense preparation. For those that were already baptized, Lent was a period to be renewed in their faith by studying the Bible, the Creed and the Lord's Prayer.

Although it was originally only a two-day period of preparation, Lent became a three-week preparatory period in the middle of the fourth century and then this was further expanded into six-weeks, or forty days. By the end of the fifth century, there was a desire to exclude Sundays from Lent since Sundays are always celebrated as feasts of the Resurrection. Thus Lent begins not on Sunday, but on Ash Wednesday.

The current practice of forty days of Lent recall Jesus' forty-day fast in the wilderness after his Baptism (Matthew 4:2, Luke 4:1-2) as well as Moses' forty-day fast on Mount Sinai (Exodus 34:28).

A Few Notes on Current Practice

The appointed liturgical color for Lent is purple because purple has long been associated with royal-ty. In this case, Christ reigns from a cross.

Currently, the ancient understanding of Lent as both a time for baptismal preparation and baptismal renewal is being rediscovered in Lutheran rites and practice. Many congregations hold mid-week services during Lent and a baptismal renewal theme is particularly appropriate for these.

Many congregations refrain from speaking or singing the word "alleluia" during Lent. "Burying" the alleluia occurs at the conclusion of worship on Transfiguration Sunday and it is restored at either the Vigil of Easter or Easter Sunday. A Lenten acclamation replaces the alleluia verse in preparation for hearing the Gospel.


