Periodic Pastoral Ponderings

(From a guy who likes alliteration a lot)

"Look, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall name him 'Emmanuel', which means, 'God is with us.'" Matthew 1:23

Dear friends in Christ,

Christmas is the season to remember our congregation's name—"Emanuel."* The name means "God with us." It is more than a name. It is a promise.

It is the promise of the Incarnation. In John one, verse fourteen we hear these words: "And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth." Jesus is the human face of God among us, with us and for us. At Christmas, we celebrate the Festival of the Incarnation of our Lord. We do not worship a god who lives at a distance, who is uninvolved in the cosmos, who is disengaged from life. We worship the "with us" God.

We proclaim that our God is with us forever. Matthew's gospel starts with the "with us" verse in the Christmas story. And Matthew's gospel ends with the "with us" Lord who sends us out in mission and service. In Matthew twenty-eight, verses nineteen and twenty, Jesus says, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age." The "with us" God is with us always.

So we are "with us" people. It is a spiritual principle that we become like what (or Who) we worship. The Holy Spirit sends us to be with anyone and everyone in need of God's compassion and mercy. Emanuel people here do so much to live out that "with us" part of our name. It's been a joy once again to be part of distributing Thanksgiving boxes and meals, preparing for Angel Tree and Cap and Mitten Tree gifts, filling up Advent boxes with items for those in need, and many other service projects. We strive here to be a "with us" congregation.

And we look forward to even greater ways to be a "with us" sort of place. We're talking in depth about starting a congregational daycare. We are growing an energetic and relational worship service on Wednesday evenings. We are deepening our friendship with our friends and neighbors at St. Pau's Episcopal Church. As a synod, we are launching a mission and service ministry with our Latino/a sisters and brothers in Denison. We are a "with us" bunch of believers.

I pray that you will meet the God "with us" in this Christmas season!

Emanuel Gift to Igumbilo

The Anniversary Committee was able to present a check from Emanuel for \$7,704 to the Igumbilo Lutheran Girls School in Tanzania during worship on November 20th.

Thank you to all who contributed money, time and effort to this project! This is a life-changing program for the students who attend the school. The school opened in 2006 with 83 students. Today the enrollment is about 450.

The school provides capacity-building educational opportunities for young women who often do not have equal access to other educational opportunities within the country. Yet, it is women who are the proven sharers of such education, resulting in wider economic development of their families and communities. This project provides scholarships to the needlest of students and educational resources such as laboratory equipment, mosquito netting, laptops and textbooks.

Jan Rosdail shared information during coffee hour about the school and opportunities for those who were interested to travel to Tanzania to see their work first hand and volunteer at the school.



A New Kind of Family

For Kristie, respite caregiving through LSI's Services for People with Disabilities is more than just a job. It's a time for her to be with family.

Kristie has helped to take care of Trevor since she began working with LSI. Trevor stays one night with her family most weekends and during many weeknights, he spends time and eats dinner with Kristie's family.

"He gets to come over and go to sporting events, or go camping, or go to family functions with us," Kristie says. "He likes to interact with my own children, who are about the same age." The whole family has developed a relationship with Trevor, and even extended family members consider him as "one of the kids."

"Respite care has been a great outlet for me and my kids, and it's a growing opportunity for all of us. I've developed a relationship with Trevor's family. It gives them a break, and my kids can learn and grow," Kristie says. "This gives me an opportunity to work with kids and still be able to do things with my own family. It doesn't interfere with my life. It adds to it."

The meeting was called to order at 7 p.m. by President Kevin Epperson.

Devotions: Peggy Jarrell

Council Agenda:

- Motion by Judi Malloy, seconded by Bob Vergamini, to approve the minutes for the meeting of October 18, 2016. Approved.
- The financial secretary's report indicated that the income for the year was behind schedule and that the pledges were not up to date. Motion by Oscar Over, seconded by CharLes Kemmmish to approve the Financial Secretary's report. Approved.
- Motion by Oscar Over, seconded by Bob Vergamini to approve the Treasurer's Report. Approved.
- Motion by Oscar Over, seconded by Peggy Maxwell, to approve the Capital Fund Report. Approved.
- Motion by Oscar Over, second by Judi Malloy, to approve the Memorial Fund Report. Approved.
- Pastor Hennigs gave his report and updates that included 20 items. He reported that the Bethany Village Project was currently on hold and that the project was being scaled down as evidenced by a letter from Michael Van Sickle, the chief operating officer, dated November 7, 2016. The council secretary was directed to send a letter to Mr. Van Sickle to address the issue of fencing between their project and the church property as it creates an attractive nuisance to children from the church. He reported that the Bethany Lutheran Home annual meeting will be held in January of 2017 and that Ken Kemmish is no longer eligible to serve on the board. He requested that someone from Emanuel volunteer to serve on that board. The meeting will be held on January 8. Pastor also requested that he be allowed to take January 29 for his grandchild's first birthday. Motion made by Judi Malloy, seconded by John Hus-

mann to allow the pastor to attend that event. Approved.

Honey of an idea

What "crop" doesn't need any extra land for production? And, its raw materials provided generously for free by mother nature? For farmers in rural India, it is honey.

Like most farmers, Sonamuni Tudu of West Bengal, India, relies on the land to produce crops to support his family. Changes in weather patterns have created challenges in food production. One alternative for him is to migrate or work at stone quarries, but both of these options carry risks, including human trafficking.

Thanks to your gifts to ELCA World Hunger, through the Lutheran World Service India Trust, the Santhal tribal people, like Sonamuni, now have a safer and a more sustainable option – beekeeping.

In this part of India, the raw materials for honey are readily available and



beehives require neither additional land nor compete with agriculture. For Sonamuni and other rural and tribal farmers, beekeeping has become an additional source of income, as they produce high-quality honey that is in demand in markets around the region.

"Beekeeping has come to us as an alternative source of income," says Sonamuni. "The extra money we earn from honey production has increased our family income, which we use to invest in our children's education, cover health care costs, and improve our living situation. We feel that we are earning money with dignity in an eco-friendly environment."

Dear members and friends,

On behalf of the Treat the Troops Project and Iowa Cookie Crumbs, I want to thank Emanuel for allowing us to use the church facilities for our monthly packing of cookies to deployed troops since 2007. In addition, the support from Emanuel's members has been phenomenal!

With our November packing, the Iowa Cookie Crumbs have sent **over 1,032,500** cookies to deployed service personnel in harms' way.

In addition on November 7th we sent 116 holiday themed boxes of comfort items filled with decorations, Christmas stockings, games, blank holiday cards/stationery, calendars, hygiene products and hand knitted helmet liners and scarves. The following week, on November 15th Pastor Lowell blessed the 235 boxes containing 30,336 cookies and took the photo below.

The Iowa Cookie Crumbs was formed by Abbie Crawford and is part of a network of volunteers with the national Treat the Troops organization (www.treatthetroops.org) begun in the 1990's by Jeanette Cram. Our first shipment of 80 dozen cookies and letters of support and thanks were packed in Abbie's kitchen in January, 2007. However, as more and more people heard about the project and wanted to help, it was apparent we could not continue packing in a home.

The Iowa Cookie Crumbs is the only group in Iowa and Nebraska and now has three teams with approximately 180 dedicated bakers a third of which bake monthly. At one time there were over 34 crumb groups across the USA – now there are only 5. We not only are the youngest of Jeanette's crumb groups – we have sent the most cookies.

Again, thank you for allowing the lowa Cookie Crumbs to use the church facilities and members – a huge thank you for your wonderful support!

As with a lot of the music we sing, learning about the carols makes them much more meaningful. A little known carol to us in this cantata is "Tomorrow Shall Be My Dancing Day".

"Tomorrow shall be my dancing day;
I would my true love did so chance
To see the legend of my play,
To call my true love to my dance!
Sing, oh! my love, oh! my love, my love,
This have I done for my true love"

This medieval carol first appeared in writing in William B. Sandys' Christmas Carols Ancient and Modern of

1833. John Rutter, whose melody is used in this version, said, "The age-old relationship between religion and the dance

is the source of the unusual and vivid imagery of this carol (which, in its complete form, has eleven verses covering all the events of Christ's life up to the Ascension)."


Some say the words are from Christ's point of view, showing His love for his bride-the church. My dancing day may refer to the day He was born. The legend of my play may refer to mystery plays of the medieval times that taught stories of the Bible. According to Thomas Cahill, in his book *Mysteries of the Middle Ages*, these plays were often done in the late middle ages, perhaps the fourteenth century. The

plays would often last three or four days, with each day ending in a dance.

In the entire carol, Jesus' life is depicted as a dance. This concept was again used in the song "Lord of the Dance" which is in our choir's repertoire.
