## <u>Happenings!</u>

## **New Study Opportunities at ELC**

# Periodic Pastoral Ponderings (from a guy who likes alliteration a lot)

Spring is the season of *opportunity*. We plant seeds with hopes for the harvest. We watch the flowers bloom and marvel at their beauty. We walk with high school and college graduates as they prepare for the next chapters of their life and work. We notice that the Chicago Cubs are playing well and think that *this* may be the year (but we'll check back in August to see how things are going).

What are the opportunities for life and ministry Emanuel Lutheran Church?

- We serve a neighborhood in transition. Homes in our area are moving from one generation to another. The former Gunn School will be remade into homes for thirty-six households. At some point Bethany Lutheran Home will build units on the field south of us. We will have new neighbors.
- We serve a neighborhood in need of a center. Because the neighborhood school is closed, ELC has become a gathering place for the North Broadway neighborhood. We are making the most of this opportunity as we collaborate on the date of our annual garage sale, as we help the neighborhood association become more effective, and as we participate in neighborhood events.
- We are building partnerships with other local congregations. We will have Vacation Bible School with Our Savior's this summer, and we are talking about having a joint worship service at Bayliss Park. Our youth are partnering with Our Savior's and two other congregations for the ELCA National Youth Gathering. We will partner with other congregations on a joint Habitat for Humanity project in September as part of our "God's Work, Our Hands" weekend. We will be part of conversations about re-creating a ministerial association in Council Bluffs.
- We have a strong high school group because of the National Youth Gathering. We have the opportunity to build on this experience and to engage our middle school youth in a vibrant youth community here. We have young people involved in leadership in the larger community and the Western Iowa Synod, and they bring those gifts to
- We have the facility, the space and the people to offer high-quality children's programming. We will have an exciting and innovative Vacation Bible School in June. We will partner with Lutheran Lakeside Bible Camp to offer a Day Camp in late July. We have some of the best green space in town. We have a fine facility for youth activities and children's education. We have a high number of capable and creative people who are involved in these efforts.
- We have a congregation deeply committed to loving service in Jesus' name. If people long for genuine community, this is the place! If people want to make a difference in the lives of the least, the lost and the lonely, this is the place! If people are looking for a church that loves fun and parties, joyful music, and healing laughter, this is the place!

## 125th ANNIVERSARY COMMITTEE NEWS

#### Remember when . . .

In the early years of Emanuel communion was served only occasionally, sometimes only once or twice per year.

**In 1924** a Meeting of the Board of Deacons and Trustees was held. A motion was made and carried that Rev. Henderson buy one gallon of California port wine to be used for Holy Communion.

**In 1939** Holy Communion was celebrated 5 times.

In 1948 there were complaints as to the taste and probable high alcohol content of the present sacramental wine. Mr. Ralph Berryhill was instruction to secure a more suitable sacramental wine.

In 1993 there was a break-in at Emanuel. Pastor Jenkins called Matt Solon to investigate who broke into "his" church. It was soon determined neighborhood teenagers had broken a window in the church and the door of the shed. Among the items taken were: lawn mower, weed eater, gas can, hand tools, \$20 cash, four offering plates, two gallons of communion wine and communion wafers.

When the teenagers were brought to the church to return the stolen property they remarked that "it was cheap wine anyway and the little 'crackers' weren't very good!" As you can imagine, Pastor Jenkins was furious that they had complained about the "cheap wine and crackers" and "those kids should be coming to church rather than breaking into church."

**Today** Holy Communion is served at most services and we have a choice of wine or grape juice. Pastor Lowell reminds us that Holy Communion is a celebration, in Holy Communion we get a preview of the feast of victory that will never end.

#### A Dream Team for Brook

On a spring day in Muscatine, LSI brought together a dream team.

A pastor, principal, guidance counselor, teacher, grandmother and mom all gathered for one reason: to make sure a special teen girl knew just how much she mattered.

The girl was Brooke, a sweet, shy 16-year-old who had been struggling at school with poor decision-making and social issues.

"Since my daughter was in kindergarten, all I had ever heard were negative comments," said her mom Nicole. "No one else saw what I saw in Brooke until LSI came along."

LSI's Dream Team program brings together all the people who care about a teen. Brooke's team listened to her share her dreams to help animals or help the elderly, and then they responded with love, encouragement and ideas.

"They talked about her big heart and how they could help her reach her goals when she graduates," Nicole said. "Brooke was ecstatic."

Brooke's self-worth has skyrocketed, said Rochelle, an LSI service coordinator.

"You can just see when you talk to her that she feels better about herself. Before you could tell she wasn't happy. Now she has a glow about her."

Brooke also spent months working with LSI's Brief Intensive Services staff to learn how to make better choices. She didn't fail a single subject last year and even made A's.

"LSI convinced us to have her re-tested, and she was diagnosed with Asperger's and ADHD," said Nicole. "Without LSI I think we would be in jeopardy of Brooke not graduating high school."

Brooke is starting to believe in herself for the first time. And that's a dream come true.

# 2015 ELCA Youth Gathering Theological Statement

We have a problem. As God's people, we have become lost. We have turned away from our relationship with God. We have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. On our own, we cannot find our way out. We need good news.

The author of the Gospel of Mark tells us the source of the good news for which we long:

# "The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God" (Mark 1:1).

The good news, Mark says, is Jesus, who is with us all along our way, a way that leads to the cross. Through the 2015 ELCA Youth Gathering, we will explore what it looks like to follow Jesus on his journey to the cross even though our first inclination – supported by the dominant narrative of American culture – is to rush to the resurrection. Mark teaches us that we can't get to the resurrection without going through the cross.

The essential act of discipleship is to follow Jesus on the way to the cross. Young people and Adult Leaders who engage the ministry of the Gathering will be invited to follow Jesus on the way as they accompany the people of Detroit in their journeys. They will learn that to "rise up" doesn't mean pursuing power or victory over another, but choosing weakness over power so that they might be together. The experience of death and life held together on the way is the "beginning of the good news;" it is God's narrative into which we are inviting young people, and in which we hope young people will nest their own stories.

There are many people in Detroit who know experiences of death. In fact, the media would have us think that Detroit itself is gasping for its last breath, near the end of its life as a major metropolitan city. But as people of the cross, we see promise in death. Martin Luther said our yearning in despair is always taken up into the suffering love of Father and Son. We partake in the very being of God as we seek God in our own awareness of death, brokenness or despair, for through the cross God has placed our brokenness at the very heart of God's life, and that is the beginning of the good news.

The meeting was called to order at 7 p.m. by President Kevin Epperson. Devotions by Matt Solon.

### Council Agenda:

- The following amendments were made to the minutes of March 10, 2015.
  - 1. Keven was corrected to Kevin under devotions.
  - 2. Soot was removed from the wall in the sanctuary.
  - 3. Capitol account was changed to capital.
- 4. After the amendments were noted, motion was made by Chris Reed, seconded by Matt Solon to approve the minutes as revised. Approved.
  - No new business was added to the agenda.
  - Motion by Oscar Over, seconded by Matt Solon to receive and approve the financial secretary report. Approved
  - Motion by Oscar Over, seconded by Penny Dahlke, to receive and approve the Treasurer's Report. Approved. It
    was suggested by Oscar Over that the treasurer's report be taken to each of the committee meetings so that
    each committee can see the status of their respective budgets.
  - Motion by Oscar Over, seconded by CharLes Kemmish, to receive and approve the Capital Fund Report. Approved.
  - Motion by Oscar Over, seconded by Michael Winter, to receive and approve the Memorial Fund report. Approved
  - Pastor's report was received and discussed. It was noted that during the month of March, there were 18 worship services among the many other duties of the pastor. Midweek Lenten services were held at both noon and 7 p.m. with good attendance and attendance at the Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, noon and evening, and Easter all showed increases over the previous year. Outdated financial records were sorted and reduced the data from 14 boxes and tubs to only three. Other sections of the pastor's report were discussed later in the meeting. The Pastor also noted that the Selden Company will turn the former Gunn School into 36 housing units to begin this summer and in 2016, North Broadway water mains are to be replaced as per the Water Works Department at a cost of \$750,000. There was also discussion of where to put the Emanuel window taken from the former church at 7<sup>th</sup> and Mill.
  - There have been no meetings of the Stewardship Committee.
  - There have been no meetings of the Youth and Children's Ministries Committee.
  - No report was received from Fellowship and Support.
  - The Property Committee has set June 6 as the spring work day. The fall work day has not yet been determined.
  - Suzanne Winter made a report of the Wider Ministries Committee indicating they are preparing backpacks for camp.
  - Kevin Epperson made a report of the Worship and Music Committee. He sought alternative bids for the lighting and they came back close to previous bids offered by Echo. Menards has cheaper dimmer switches than the bid provided by Echo. It was also discussed involving members from many committees in this year's garage sale to be held on August 8. Those committees participating can split the proceeds among them.
  - It was reported by Pastor that our church appears to be ahead of the average in use of social media such as facebook.

- CharLes Kemmish talked about the cost of constructing a digital sign. She found a range of between \$2,700 and \$7,000. The digital sign could be used to announce birthdays, anniversaries, gathering information and much more.
- Pastor reported on the Transition Team in his report and indicated they met on March 23 and that the team plans a second feedback session after worship on June 7. The next meeting of the Transition Team will be April 28. A determination needs to be made as to who will be on the calling committee.
- The Pastor's report included an update on the 125<sup>th</sup> anniversary. The anniversary team met on April 8. Children's Square will donate the "Emanuel" window from the 7<sup>th</sup> & Mill site to Emanuel Lutheran Church after having it appraised. The photo scanning project is continuing and the first disk of scanned photos has been returned. The Remembrance Tea will be held in August. The anniversary team hosted a Lenten supper and raised \$280 for team expenses. The next meeting is May 5.
- There has been a very good response concerning signing up for pictures for the church directory and there remain very few additional people to be called.
- Oscar Over gave a very detailed report from the Property Committee. The tub in the parsonage needs repair and an electrostatic application would cost \$350-\$400. The Property Committee contacted Bath Fitters and recommended a shell to be placed over the old tub. Oscar Over made a motion to install the white shell from Bath Fitters at a cost of \$1,448 plus tax over the old tub. The motion was seconded by Penny Dahlke and approved. The money will come from the building and grounds portion of the capital and building account. The tub shell will have a lifetime guaranty.
- The air conditioner was repaired at a cost of \$800 by Moore's Heating & Air Conditioning, but during the installation, it was determined that an additional motor would be required at a cost of plus or minus \$500. This money will also come from the building and grounds portion of the capital and building account. Motion was made by Oscar Over, seconded by CharLes Kemmish. Approved.
- It was reported that Ron Reef will construct a sanctuary railing. Motion was made by Oscar Over, seconded by Chris Reed to proceed with the construction of the sanctuary railing. Approved.
- The church cornerstone needs to be repaired and Larry Hansen will do the work for material costs only. Motion made by Suzanne Winter, seconded by Danielle Schaal to leave the cornerstone in its present location for repair and to proceed with the repair. Approved.
- Oscar Over reported that there has been discussion of constructing a ramp from the parking lot adjacent to the sidewalk. The property committee is still thinking about how this will be accomplished including the possible installation of a railing.
- The Property Committee addressed the problem in the northwest corner of the sanctuary where the carpet gets wet when it rains. They suggested the installation of a gutter and drain pipe at an estimated cost of \$400. Motion by made by Oscar Over, seconded by Matt Solon to proceed with this project. Approved. The money will come from the building and grounds portion of the capital building account.
- The Property Committee recommended aluminum sheets to be installed near the entry to the Narthex with brown aluminum sheets at a cost of \$175. Motion by Oscar Over, seconded by CharLes Kemmish to approve this project. Approved.
- Discussion was held concerning the recommendations of the Worship and Music Committee that included going
  to one Sunday service at 9:30 the year round followed by coffee hour and to implement this new policy by
  September 13, 2015. A second service would be held each Wednesday evening at 7 p.m. Motion made by
  Michael Winter, seconded by Danielle Schaal to go ahead with the recommendation of the Worship and Music
  Committee with a congregational vote to take place on June 7 after the regular service. Approved.
- Pastor requested permission to distribute envelopes to fund the Synod Assembly to be held at the end of May. Motion by Suzanne Winter, seconded by Danielle Schaal. Approved.
- Motion by Suzanne Winter, seconded by Penny Dahlke to adjourn. Motion approved unanimously.



## Ramblings from the back corner....

The theme song for the Easter season is "Light Dawns on a Weary Word" ELW 726. In the Hymnal Companion to the ELW it gives a beautiful explanation of the hymns lyrical and musical inception. I found it extremely interesting and wonderful to look into the creative process of hymn composition.

"Mary Louise Bringle (b. July 31, 1953) wrote this hymn in 2001 at the meeting of the Hymn Society in the United States and Canada in Independence, Missouri. She explains it in detail in *The Hymn* 57:4 (Autumn 2006): 62-65. The story begins with the melody, so you might begin by reading below about it. When the composer played it for her it was, she said, "love at first listen." She began writing the text that night in her motel room.

Bringle received the tune with the harmonization. The lone set of four sixteenth notes in the alto line of the refrain caught her attention. (They come where "with" is now positioned after "forth.") She heard them as a water fountain, which suggested a watered garden. That suggested the watered garden in Isaiah 58:11, which is an image for the vision of a just society with an end to oppression after the Babylonian captivity. That in turn suggested Isaiah 55:12-13, and the first lines of the refrain were born. The next day Fred Kaan gave a plenary address on the need for Christians, Jews, and Muslims to work together for peace-shalom. Bringle says, "I found myself reflecting on Kaan's remarks in the light of Isaiah's vision of a truly just community-one in which harmonious relationships are restored not only among human beings but also between humans and the natural world. The idea of closing the hymn by having the entire creation call out 'Shalom' appealed to me," and the last line of the refrain was born. The internal repetitions of the Os in "word," "wonder," "echo," and "shalom" took the place of rhyme in the refrain.

The stanzas are successive extensions of light, hope, and love. The second and third continue the internal Os. All three with their following verbs form a most unusual spondee, two stressed syllables in succession. That immediately leads to two short iambic (an unstressed syllable followed by a stressed one) lines that rhyme "see" with "dignity," "bread" with "fed," and "forlorn" with "reborn." These and other phrases of the hymn "reflect aspects of what the book of Isaiah holds up as a vision of the beloved community, blessed with life in all its fullness." The overall formal structure does the same thing. The spondee announces, the rhymed iambic lines provide communal content and push forward, and the whole creation breaks into song and echoes shalom.

#### **TEMPLE OF PEACE**

In 2000 the Hymn Society in the United States and Canada met in Boston. At that meeting William P. Rowan led a sectional called "A Collection of Hymns without Words: His "hypothesis was that a composer might arrive at structurally interesting settings for future hymns by letting musical forms rather that words animate the creative process." He wrote eighteen tunes that stimulated about a hundred texts. That in turn encouraged him to write more tunes, for a similar sectional the next year at the Hymn Society meeting in Independence, Missouri. A few days before the sectional Rowan played this tune for Mary Louise Bringle because he was sure she would like it. That stimulated the hymn. After the text was written, Bringle named the tune TEMPLE OF PEACE, for the chapel of the Community of Christ where the Hymn Society had met."
