

A Post from the Pastor

It's a lovely afternoon in the beginning of summer. After such a long season of darkness it's such a relief to enjoy increasing hours of daily sunlight. This is the time of year for picnics, and vacations, waterparks and fishing...so many enjoyable and pleasurable activities to enjoy. While COVID is far from over, we're beginning to see more light, and with the vaccination, can venture out a little more and do so safely. This week the synod sent the following guidelines to consider: all individuals

who have NOT been vaccinated should wear a mask. Please get vaccinated. In mixed settings vaccinated individuals may wish to wear a mask. We are relying on peoples' personal responsibility and care for the neighbor. Social anxiety about removal of masks and being in crowds will be evident. Here at Emanuel we are all at different comfort levels concerning safety and health. And for that reason we are opening up more but at a moderate pace. Masks are now optional. We have seating for those who wish to physically distance marked by tape and areas for those who wish to sit together. The CDC and the national organization of church musicians still requires masks to be worn when singing. We have resumed coffee hour with safety considerations in place. We want to welcome all to worship in person and online in a way that people can feel comfortable and welcome.

Some of you may know I've recently began using Noom, an application to increase health. I'm losing pounds and inches and am already feeling so much better. Sometimes we have to revisit even simple things we already know to face head on the challenges in front of us. So here are some things I'm relearning about health and life in general.

- 1) Dieting, like life, is made up of moment to moment decisions. The choices I make now will impact me in the future.
- 2) Also, one slipup doesn't have to be an excuse to quit. There's always the next moment, the next opportunity to make better decisions.
- 3) I'm learning about setting healthy boundaries and saying yes to what is life giving and no to what is not. I'm also moving away all or nothing thinking. I'm not saying I'm not ever going to eat donuts again, I'm just not right at this moment.
- 4) Life, and eating, is about balance and moderation. A lot harder to do than say.

It occurred to me these guidelines are helpful in our life of Christian discipleship as well. Luther says salvation is a day by day, even moment by moment occurrence. And grace abounds. When we slip up I think sometimes it's harder to extend grace to ourselves than to others. The Apostle Paul says I know the things I want to do, but I do not do them. I can relate! But we always strive to say yes to what brings life and no to that which takes away our delight and joy from God. God is a God of beauty and order—balance and moderation seem to fit here too. We all are most of the time I believe trying our best, sometimes struggling, relying on God's love and grace to lead and guide us into greater love, greater health, and greater well-being! Thanks be to God! I know I can't do it under my own willpower.

So here's to healthier life physically, mentally, emotionally, and spiritually! Let's support and uphold one another in all our endeavors.

Amen, which means, So Be It!



The meeting was called to order at 7:00pm by President Mike Winter. Pastor Cara gave devotions.

Secretary's minutes from the April meeting: Motion to approve by Mike Loos, seconded by Mike Hipnar. Motion carried.

Pastor Cara gave her monthly written report. She would like to request Sunday, June 13 off. CeCe Mickells from Bethany Lutheran is available to lead the service. Motion to approve by Char Les Kemmish, seconded by Connie Edson. Motion carried.

Old Business:

- Motion to approve Garage sale donating proceeds to Own Hansen by Greg Steensland, seconded by Mike Loos. Motion carried.
- Streaming capabilities and audio equipment - Three bids were received from Electronic Contracting Company (\$42,535 and \$17,391 optional); TMS Production Integration (\$19,680.51); and Midwest Sound & Lighting (\$16,966). Greg Steensland recommended we get feedback from Larry Britton and/or Mike Garrens to help us sort through these bids.

Finding Paradise

Perseverance is a familiar quality for Mon, who after spending decades living as a refugee from an early age was recently able to place roots in Iowa and succeed in building a life for his family.

After living in a Nepali refugee camp for almost 24 years, Mon's family was able to resettle in the U.S. When they arrived in Iowa, they moved directly into a tiny apartment. But the single room was not sufficient for their family – especially once their youngest daughter was born. They stayed in the apartment for four years, but Mon was determined to create a better home for his family.

Mon secured housing for his family through the Habitat for Humanity program, and through LSI Refugee and Immigrant Services, he was able to get on track

and save and earn money towards his goal of home-ownership. With guidance from staff in LSI's Match and Save financial program, he was able to open a savings account and develop a monthly savings plan.

Mon and his family moved into their new home last year, and he said LSI and Habitat for Humanity were critical steps in helping him learn about U.S. finances and savings – lessons that will pay off during his journey as a homeowner.

"I felt very sad when I left my country," Mon says. "I felt as if I lost my paradise. But when I got the key and when I entered my house, I felt that I regained my lost paradise. So that was the happiest moment in my life and right now, I, my family, and kids are super happy to live in this new house."



Quilting for a Cause

Carol Joy Holling is hosting their annual quilt auction July 31st. Funds raised through the Quilt Auction go directly to support our summer camping programs, making possible our promise that no child will be turned away because they can't pay the fee. This policy and your quilt donations are catalysts for hundreds of lives changed each summer, as campers and their families grow closer to Christ in an intentional Christian community.



Donating Quilts

They are currently looking for quilters to donate items to the auction. Quilts of all sizes are welcome. Buyers are usually looking for standard-sized quilts. Tied, machine-quilted, hand-quilted, and handstitched quilts are all found at the auction.

Quilts should be delivered to Carol Joy Holling Camp between June 1 and July 26, 2021. The quilts will be auctioned in the order received at camp. It is very important that the enclosed instructions for delivery are followed closely to keep accurate records and to give proper credit to those donating quilts. A color photograph of your quilt is needed to assist in cataloging the quilts. The photo needs to clearly show the design of the quilt. When photographing the quilt, please turn over one corner of it to show the back side. The photo should accompany the quilt when it is delivered. On the back of the photo (in ink), please list the congregation or individuals donating the quilt and their city. We also encourage you to take photos throughout the completion of the quilt and send a few of those along with your quilt to show off the faces belonging to the warm hearts and caring hands that made the quilt! These photographs will be given to the buyer along with the quilt to add a special touch to their purchase. Quilts can be mailed, hand delivered, or sent along with pastors or campers coming to camp. (They should bring the quilt with them to registration.) A quilt donation form is available online or in the church office.

Ramblings from the Back Corner

What is that composer really saying? When I listen to a piece of music there are so many things to decipher. It is, after all, another language. And just like words, standing alone notes don't mean much. They each have a pitch but the sound we hear for one pitch can be extremely varied depending on what instrument plays that pitch. When you combine them into a pattern, into a melody, then the music thought really begins to take shape.

What happens when I just get stuck on that melody and I don't really hear any more than that? I don't hear the rhythm that drives it, the harmonies that define it, the form that it takes to shape the whole song, the tone color that it takes on because the cellos are playing followed by oboes. What happens when I stop listening to the whole piece and become fixated on the melody?


Sometimes this happens to me. I hear that wonderful

melody and my mind goes down a rabbit hole thinking of it and other wonderful melodies. And all at once I realize the whole song is over and I've missed the full essence of the piece. And, if listening on the radio, it may be gone for good. I may not hear it again unless I go hunt it down on the internet; find out what was playing at that particular time on that particular station. Then it takes great effort, when all I had to do was open up and listen, not think, not judge, just stay open and listen to fully appreciate what that composer was trying to say to me. Too often this happens when I listen to music, and I'm afraid,

when I listen to people. I think too much at that moment instead of being open. And if I do this with music and with people, then-oh my-what am I doing when God talks to me?

Slow my mind down, God, so I can really hear the music, the people, and you.
