Periodic Pastoral Ponderings (from a guy who likes alliteration a lot)

Dear friends in Christ,

I have a bit of news to share from our last church council meeting.

Bishop Rodger Prois and Rev. Jeff Ungs, Director for Evangelical Mission in the Western Iowa Synod, have approached Kevin Epperson and me to propose that Emanuel Lutheran Church will consider a process of congregational renewal and redevelopment. According to the Division for Evangelical Mission's description, "Congregations receiving support in this program need a new missional identity in order to focus on ministry in a new way. These congregations have been declining and may (but not necessarily) have had some ministry crisis or significant losses. These congregations form a covenant and receive transformational training as a mandatory component of being in this program."

The ELCA's Division for Evangelical Mission assists synods of this church in launching new ministries and renewing existing ministries for witness and service. "Congregational renewal is a Biblical journey by which [existing] congregations deepen their understanding of the word of God, expand their practice of the word into the world, and share with others the beauty of the word and its relevance for the Christian walk into the world. The journey will result in a more active engagement in God's mission and an increase in their capacity for multiplying ministry in the world." (from the Program Description of this service from the Division for Evangelical Mission).

Our Bishop and our Director for Evangelical Mission invite Emanuel Lutheran Church to enter a process of Congregational Renewal and Redevelopment with me as the pastoral leader at Emanuel Lutheran Church for this process. That proposal was shared with our church council for further consideration. The council will engage in reflection and in conversation with the congregation regarding this invitation.

If the congregation would agree to this invitation, the congregation would agree to call me for a "term call" of up to five years. A term call is a call from a congregation for a specified period of time with a specific purpose for that call. The purpose of this term call would be congregational redevelopment and renewal for Emanuel Lutheran Church. Then the congregation would budget some funds (up to \$500) to send me to the ELCA's Mission Redeveloper Training event in Chicago in February of 2016. Then the church council, in consultation with me, would appoint a seven member Renewal Team to oversee this process and report monthly to the church council and quarterly to the congregation on the progress of this process. The Renewal Team would begin its work at the point where the Transition Team has completed its work. If plans for renewal were to involve substantial investments of funds for current staff, for facility renovation, for ministry program materials, or other items related to growing the ministry here, the Renewal Team could develop a plan and submit a funding request to the Division for Evangelical Mission.

The process of congregational renewal is open-ended. Even though there are limits to this process in the term call model and the funding availability, the intention is that a congregation will learn how to be a continually renewing community of faith. Nothing would please Brenda and me more than to spend this time serving with you. Please be sure to share your thoughts, questions and concerns with a member of our Church Council. We pray for the Holy Spirit's guidance in our discernment with you.

Finance Team Update

Income & Expenses Monthly and YTD

June Income: \$7,949.14 YTD Income: \$60,564.24 June Expense: \$13,814.78 YTD Expense: \$74,725.96 (June expense includes \$3800.00 for Sanctuary lights; this expense will be drawn from the Property & Grounds Capitol Fund)

Actual June Expense: \$10,014.78 Actual YTD Expense: \$70,925.96

June Balance: -\$2065.65 YTD Balance: -10,361.72

In reviewing our position, two concerns:

- * This year we had a negative cash flow starting in April, the earliest time frame this has happened in recent years.
- * Very little of the \$9585 of faith giving (difference between anticipated income in 2015 and the actual budget passed in January) has been addressed. Through May, we should have received additional income over pledges of \$3995 in faith giving which we did not. We all need to consider what role we can play in making up this \$9585 for the year.

We continue to monitor expenses. Currently two accounts total over \$1000 of the \$1570 over budgeted estimates. We feel we can control expenses to the budgeted figures but it would be very difficult to lower them below that point.

We thank you for your cheerful giving in 2015 and are thankful that we have 100% of the anticipated pledges in through May. We ask for your continued support.

Synod Assembly Report!

Jeff and I went to Synod Assembly on May 29th and 30th, 2015 at the Clay County Fairgrounds in Spencer, Iowa.

This year the meeting was more condensed than other years but it was full. After devotions on Friday, one of the highlights of the assembly was having the camp counselors from Lutheran Lakeside lead worship. Here's to Allyson Sorenson for being a part of that!

On Saturday, Emanuel was acknowledged for celebrating its 125th anniversary and for giving 10% more to mission.

I think the best resolution was "We Are The Church----Facing Hunger", This was to as a synod collectively gather and donate 100,000 pounds of food or monetary equivalent to area food banks in our synod. A list of of local food banks was given to us (there are about 30) which are located in northwest lowa.

This resolution was resoundingly adopted by the assembly and I thought it was the most thoughtful and prayerful resolution.

On Saturday, we ended with worship at about 7:30 p.m. Worship was wonderful again as it was on Friday evening.

These are just a few notes about the assembly. If anyone has question let Jeff and I know.

One more thing, I was elected to Synod Council representing Rivers of Grace. I have been to one meeting on June 25, 2015. It was mostly orientation, but I will also try to keep you updated on that as more meetings occur.

Emanuel Holds Outdoor Worship August 23rd

Sunday worship at Emanuel will be held in the dugout area behind the church garage just to the south of the parsonage. But why?

It's all about history. In 1959 Emanuel Lutheran Church purchased what was then known as the Brightman property, twelve acres at our current location. Initially the worship and Sunday School were held in the house on the property. During the late summer of 1961, services were held in a natural chapel area—the place where worship will happen on August 23rd.

"The first time we looked at the church grounds," said Pastor Arthur Freeburg, "we felt this a natural spot for an outdoor chapel." Freeburg was Emanuel's pastor from 1960 to 1966. "Trees nearly formed an archway at the opening of this area" (from an article in the Council Bluffs *Nonpareil*).

Of course, the site needed a great deal of preparation. Don Anderson, a member of the congregation, spent more than eight weeks digging out the area by hand. He cut down dead trees, removed thicket and weeds, and turned the twelve-foot high bank into a three-tiered terrace. He and others put up wood crosses and set rocks and stones to add to the beauty of the site. Anderson and his helpers placed a waterproof altar at the front of the worship area. The altar was built by Johnny Nolan, age 14, as a Boy Scout "God and Country" project.

A number of youth in the congregation helped Anderson saw logs into rough-hewn benches for the worshippers. Seats were made available for over a hundred. Anderson finished the project just prior to July 22nd, when he left for basic training with U. S. Army Intelligence. The site was used for worship and for Luther League devotionals.

In honor of our heritage, we will worship at that site on August 23rd. Bring your lawn chairs, your family and friends (and perhaps some bug spray and sunglasses) as we appreciate this site once more. If you would like to help clear some of the branches and bushes from the site, you can help on Saturday, August 15th at 10 a.m. Bring tools for cutting branches and removing weeds.

If the weather is disagreeable, we will worship in our indoor sanctuary.

YOUTH MINISTRY LEADS EMANUEL TO RESPOND TO LUTHERAN LAKESIDE CAPITAL FUND APPEAL

While some things about camp - like the supportive environment to nurture faith and relationships - never change, other areas must be upgraded to meet needs and preferences of campers today. Increasingly, campers and other groups are seeking camps and retreat centers with greater comfort and privacy than Lakeside Camp facilities currently afford. In response, camp leadership recognizes the need to respond to this shifting climate.

In 2013, Lakeside Camp received two houses which have been moved onto the camp site to further the outreach and ministry of the camp. These houses, and renovation of a third house already part of camp life, will increase camper capacity by providing added space and comfort for families, groups, and individuals throughout the year, and a Welcome Center which will improve administrative space.

For these additions and improvements to be realized, Lakeside leadership has initiated "All Are Welcome," a \$550,000 campaign to renovate the three facilities and to strengthen on-going support for the ministry of Lakeside Camp.

Emanuel Lutheran Church has been challenged to raise \$500 per year for three years to respond to this wonderful opportunity. The Youth Ministry Committee will host the coffee fellowship on August 23rd and asks for your support in helping to raise this year's commitment of \$500 for our camp. Making a "Day and Night" Difference for Ethan

Kim was at her wit's end. Her son Ethan, who had been bullied, was fighting with other youth at his middle school. Her daughter Dejah was also struggling with her parents' divorce. "I didn't know what to do," Kim said. "I'd tried everything." Ethan's school eventually referred Kim to LSI's Brief Intensive Services. And that's when everything changed. "It was day and night with the kids," she said. "At first they weren't doing so great, but after awhile it was a complete turnaround." LSI's Brief Intensive Services does just what its name describes - an LSI caseworker partners with a family for short time, meeting as often as needed, to help children and teens who are struggling with school, a crisis or behaviors. The unique community program, available in the Muscatine and Davenport areas, is made free to families by local funders and supports those who may not qualify for traditional services.

Ethan warmed up quickly to his LSI caseworker Ryan during weekly meetings. He started building skills like learning how to calmly handle frustration and how to make and keep friendships. "I was nervous about people coming to our home and how Ethan would react," Kim said. "But I thought if someone came where he's comfortable, he might open up." LSI helped the family learn to communicate again. Today Ethan is getting all A's and B's in school. His school suspensions are a thing of the past, and he's made some new friends.


"Things are more stable," Kim said. "We can talk and cope rather than yelling and screaming. LSI helped us understand each other better."

Women's Ministry

Emanuel women will soon have a display to sell Fair Trade coffee!

Started in 1996, the LWR Coffee Project is a collaboration between Equal Exchange and Relief to involve Lutheran Lutheran World communities and individuals in supporting small

farmers around the world.



to LWR's Small Farmer Fund. That Fund amounted to \$34.435.48 in 2014 alone!

The Small Farmers Fund has supported a number of LWR projects across multiple regions. Below, are a few projects that the SFF supported in recent vears:

- "Strengthening Small Coffee Farmers in Flores through Capacity Building;" Program Dates 10/14-9/15; This project aims to improve the livelihood and strengthen the ability of 100 small-scale farmers in Flores, Indonesia through teaching sustainable agriculture efforts.
- "Strengthening Food Autonomy and Self Government in Arhuaca Communities of Ye; In partnership with Programa de Desarrollo y Paz del Cesar, LWR worked to reduce food insecurity by improving the marketing. production institutional organization for coffee produced by three indigenous communities. This project directly worked with 4, 629 individuals, specifically 1,929 and 2,700 women, while promoting sustainable agriculture and strengthening selfgovernment among the Arhuaca communities to improve indigenous economies and food autonomy.
- APOKO: Coffee producers working together in Rachuonyo South to sustain their livelihoods: LWR worked to improve the livelihood of more than 5,500 coffee producers in the Rachounyao South district in Kenya by significantly increasing both coffee production and farmers' income.

A Note about Equal Exchange: Equal Exchange is a Fair Trade organization that buys directly from small-scale farmer cooperatives, owned and run by the farmers themselves. Because our farmer partners are paid above market prices for their crops, they are able to make investments in community projects, educational programs, and These technical trainings. cooperative organizations also help keep rural communities healthy and strong, and keep local cultures vibrant. Equal Exchange is also committed to supporting sustainable farming methods that help green the earth through reforestation, natural resource conservation and organic practices.



It's hard to believe our long awaited trip to Detroit is It would take pages to describe the life changing experiences all of us had over our 6-day trip. Together we learned how our individual stories are God's story, explored the social justice issues facing this world and how we as the church respond, and we were deeply immersed in a Detroit neighborhood where we work along neighbors to clean up debris and trash. We laughed and cried and together explored what it means to Bear Burdens, Break Chains, Build Bridges, and Bring Hope. We were able to see how we, as young adults committed to social justice, can engage in the larger church. We will never be the same and you will see our commitment to Rising Up displayed in our actions and our activities. We want to thank the congregation for their support as we planned and prepared for this trip. Thanks to your generous support, not only were we able to fully fund the trip, we also donated over 2200 diapers and left \$500 in offering and mission support. As we get back to our daily lives we remember the words of Speaker Marian Wright-Edleman "Jesus didn't win any popularity contest. He got out there and spoke the mandate of the gospel."

WIDER MINISTRIES NEWS

125th ANNIVERSARY COMMITTEE NEWS

Remember when . . .

1911 - Paving of Mill Street

August – "Meeting of the Board of Trustees met informally and discussed what procedure we should follow in the paying of the paving of Mill Street. The majority favored the subscription plan and it was decided to call a general meeting to decide the course to follow." In the October 1911 minutes it is noted "Our pastor, Rev. Glad, reported to the Board that the entire subscription for the paying of the pavement on Mill St. had been secured."

In the original journal of Council Meetings 1890-1926 on Pages 131 and 134-135 there is a "Redovisning subscription of for gatabilaggning 1911" (translated as: "Accounting of *subscription for the settlement of the street"*). On these pages it appears that 50 people subscribed between \$2-\$20 for the paving. \$314 was subscribed and \$443.19 was paid out. I believe the street paving cost to be \$341 and the sidewalk paving an additional \$100. According to the Council Bluffs City Clerk's records, E.A. Wichman paved Mill St. from 8th to Scott, among other streets, begining in 1910 and finishing in 1911.

The City Clerk posted a notice in the Co. Bluffs Daily Nonpareil on the 15th & 16th of August 1911; and on August 12, 1911 hand bills were posted along the streets, avenues and alleys where said paving occurred. If not paid, said assessment would be levied and assessed against each lot, part of lot and parcel of ground.

If you would like to read the Assessment Resolution by the City Council in full, a copy is in the Anniversary display case in the fellowship hall.

Council minutes for 07/14/2015-submitted by Suzanne Winter

7 p.m. meeting called to order by President Kevin Epperson.

Devotions: Ruth Sullivan-Prayer for Peace

Council Agenda:

- Oscar motioned, Chris 2nd that Ruth Sullivan be approved to replace Debbie Ferguson on the church council. Motioned approved
- Secretary's June minutes-Motion to approve by Oscar, 2nd by Chris. Approved (written reports available to congregation from specific committees or from Brenda)
- Financial Secretary's (Consolidated) report-Discussion by Oscar explained that approximately \$3800 from the Building & Ground Fund came out of the wrong account but this will soon be corrected. Motion to approve report made by Oscar, 2nd by Penny. Approved
- Treasurer's report-Oscar moved to accept, 2nd by Ruth. Approved
- Capital Fund report-Motion by Oscar, 2nd by CharLes. Approved
- Memorial Fund report-Motion by Oscar, 2nd by Karen. Approved
- Oscar mentioned Special Needs Fund still has funds available. This fund was established to assist members of Emanuel should the need arise. Pastor is in charge of disbursement with approval from council president, vice president or treasurer.
- Pastor's written report was submitted-he called our attention to the following items:
 - 1. The Anniversary Team met June 15. He mentioned the upcoming Remembrance Tea on August 2. He had just visited David Appel who was in the hospital for pneumonia. David was scheduled to be released and visited with pastor about all his stories he would be sharing at the tea.
 - 2. Pastor requested vacation from August 24-30. Suzanne motioned that council approve this vacation, Penny 2nd. Approved
- Stewardship Committee-lengthy discussion between Oscar and council about budget being in the negative. In
 January the congregation voted to approve the current budget which was higher than the anticipated receipts.
 There were many issues causing the higher budget such as increased premiums for health insurance, trying to
 give a little more to synod, etc. Not wanting to cut services the congregation voted to approve the 2015 budget
 hoping that faith giving would cover the difference. It was suggested a temple talk in September might be
 needed to encourage members to help make up the difference. The committee will continue to monitor the
 situation to keep the council informed.
- Youth & Children's Ministries-written report provided. Pastor mentioned that the youth plus over 3,000 diapers had departed that morning for their gathering in Detroit 4 hours late due to communication error by bus company. But by the end of the council meeting we learned the bus was 150 miles from Detroit so youth would arrive ahead of schedule.
- Fellowship & Support-Pastor mentioned coffee hour was covered.
- Property Committee presented a written report. Oscar stated that the fall work day would be August 29. The fellowship hall & kitchen would be painted at that time. Members had suggested the walls be painted Khaki Sand. Penny motioned that all walls be painted that color, Ruth 2nd. Approved. Oscar mentioned the A/C for the office had to be fixed by Moore's Heating & Air. He also informed us that the flat roof over the older part of the building had to be repaired by Bates Roofing.

- Wider Ministries-no report but Suzanne mentioned that Judy was to decide what organization should receive the Joyful Noise offering in July. Judy was planning on speaking with Pastor about the Special Needs Fund. If that did not need additional funds she would speak with Kanesville Therapy. The 3rd possibility was MICAH House.
- Worship & Music-written report submitted. Kevin discussed the following items:
 - 1. Emanuel's annual garage sale on August 8 would disperse profits as follows: 50% to the 125th Anniversary Committee, 15% (maximum of \$500) to Fresh Start Team, 35% to Worship & Music
 - 2. Fire Pit Night with Community Open House Saturday October 10
 - 3. a larger amplifier and a monitor were purchased by the committee
 - 4. hanging the projectors in the sanctuary will be done when the lighting work is completed.
 - 5. new Paraments still being discussed by the committee
 - 6. Rosie to check about ordering more "God's Work Our Hands" t-shirts
 - 7. Debbie Ferguson to check with Woodman about getting different flags that would fit our flag poles.
- Evangelism-did not meet but CharLes reported to council her research regarding digital signage. She has spoken with at least 4 congregations who have made the switch to exterior digital signs for the front of their buildings. Prices ranged from \$2700 up to \$10,000 depending on volunteers vs. professional installation, size, ordered locally vs. on line, etc. She spoke with the city about permits. Council mentioned that the church will probably need an electrical permit. She was advised to continue her investigation, seek bids, etc. so the Evangelism committee could make an informed request to the Council about signage. Pastor recommended that the request be presented to the congregation at the annual congregational meeting.
- Mutual Ministries-no report

Old Business

- 125th Anniversary Committee-Congregation encouraged to attend the upcoming Remembrance Tea. In honor of the 125th celebration the committee proposed a mission project through the synod, which would be a donation of text books to a girl's school in Tanzania.
- Transition Team-final task is to complete the ministry sight profile. Profile would then be presented to council, then the congregation, before going to synod for approval. Profile should be completed soon.
- Copier-Oscar reported that the copy machine can be purchased for \$1 when our lease runs out on November 1. Solutions, the company that services it, said they could continue to service the copier after Nov. 1 for approx. \$132/month. This is about a \$90 savings per month because the machine would be paid for at the end of current lease agreement. Suzanne motioned that Oscar be authorized to make these arrangements. CharLes 2nd. Pastor stated that the copier has worked well over the last few years, much better than most of the copy machines he has worked with in the paste. Motion approved

New Business

- Ruth & a few other members have been sorting through storage areas. They have found
 - 1. one broken table
 - 2. two broken ping pong tables
 - 3. 17 unused desk chairs
 - 4. theater lights

Ruth has checked with the appropriate members of church to make sure these items are unwanted. She asked council for permission to dispose of them by finding new homes, putting in the garage sale, etc. Oscar so moved that council grant her this authority, Suzanne 2nd. Motion approved

- Little Free Library-they are being painted. Penny suggested that the one being installed on the east side of
 church should be set so cars would not stop on the roadway. This would block travel for emergency vehicles &
 other cars. It was suggested that the library doors be turned so they open towards the church and not towards
 the road.
- Handicap spaces-members have asked for more handicap spaces now that Emanuel has permanently gone to
 one service. Suzanne motioned that the Property Committee be authorized to add 3 more handicap spaces to
 the lower parking lot placed where the committee felt they needed to be. Plus, as pastor suggested, to install a
 sign in the lower parking lot directing over flow traffic to the upper parking lot. Chris 2nd motion. Approved

- It was suggested we send Larry & Tyler Hansen a thank you for restoring the corner stone. Also a thank you to Brad Dahlke for his work on the lights in the sanctuary & the gutter over the front entrance. Chris will contact Debbie to bring the cards that were made by members to the office so they can be used for this. Once the cards are at church Kevin will send out the thank you notes.
- It was brought to our attention that Kevin & pastor had recently met with Bishop Prois and Rev. Jeff Ungs. The purpose of the meeting was to explore a possible call for Pastor Hennigs to remain at Emanuel as a "term pastor" transitioning from an "interim pastor". Term pastors are called by the congregation itself rather than from the synod. This call could last up to five years. Pastor's roll would be to help Emanuel with its redevelopment and renewal to grow in faith. Pastor said he was agreeable to this and has served in this capacity before. Pastor mentioned that Emanuel's highest attendance of 162 people a week was back in 1989. Attendance has been declining since then. There are grants available for congregations who need financial help with this process. The congregation would need to budget around \$500 to send Pastor Hennigs to the Mission Redeveloper Training event in Chicago next February. Once the Transition Team has completed its work then a Renewal Team of 7 members would be appointed to oversee this process and to report monthly to council & quarterly to congregation. This could take up to 3 years.

Pastor left the room so council could discuss this further. Remarks by council were very positive towards this possibility. Kevin directed council to speak with other members about this matter to see how members felt about it. Council will discuss this possibility at our next meeting.

Motion to adjourn approved. Closed with the Lord's Prayer.
